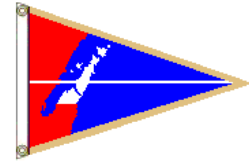

FROM THE EDUCATION OFFICER

On February 25, in conjunction with Quarterdeck's Winter Fest, our first seminar of 2012-**VHF & VHF/DSC Marine Radio** was held with approximately 15 students. Chuck Stone was the instructor for the seminar. Thanks Chuck for being our lead-off instructor for 2012!

Last month I reported, I was on my way to the Annual Meeting in Jacksonville. I'd like to summarize my take-a-ways from the Jacksonville meeting as they impact education within USPS.

An effort is underway to establish a national identity or "brand" for USPS. This may include a new logo, expanded use of the internet and increased emphasis on PR, both at the District as well as the Squadron levels. A marketing Advisory Team has been formed within the Education Department to assist in this. Dr. Ed Mahoney, Director of the Recreational Marine Research Center at Michigan State University, has been retained as consultant. Dr. Mahoney will be conducting a survey of members as well as non-members. He suggests the survey be focused on **Values Dimensions** not the things we do: What do our customers want, and how can we satisfy them?

An immediate focus is needed to increase educational sales from public and member courses as well as seminars. During one of the educational workshops that I attended, the National Treasurer, Dick Peoples, reported that there is a budget shortfall of \$225,000 in net educational sales.

There is real value in continuing to enrich our current *Partnerships* and expand, foster and take advantage of new ones.

We need to address the realities of online educational modalities and communicate the big picture and the benefits to the squadrons; to assure we all don't fall back on the adversarial concept of the national organization engaging in activities at the expense of squadrons.

Maybe it's just me. But, there seemed to be a larger presence of our preferred partners: The US Coast Guard, the US Coast Guard Auxiliary and the Canadian Power Squadrons.

NEEDED!
A FEW GOOD MEN AND WOMEN
TO BECOME VSEs



What's a VSE (Vessel Safety Examiner)?

We are men and women who have been trained-and USCG-certified- to inspect recreational vessels for required safety equipment and conditions.

Why are VSCs (Vessel Safety Checks) Important?

VSCs are a civic service to the boating community. Our focus on safety of the boat and the crew on the water. It can be a life saver. Really. We call attention to fire extinguishers that have lost pressure or are very old and may not work, we discover missing or expired distress signaling flares and we discover failing, installed equipment such as horns, bilge blowers, etc. Skippers who welcome us aboard like our help. The service is free and we do not represent or notify law enforcement.

How you can become a VSE

The steps are easy, and we are happy to help you.

Study the VSE training manual. It teaches us about required and other safety equipment for sail and power boats of different lengths, with open or enclosed decks, diesel or gasoline engines, etc. Several hours of study are usually needed.

Take the on-line exam, 30 minutes or so. It is graded by representatives of the Coast Guard.

After passing the exam, accompany one of our experienced VSEs during 5 vessel safety checks. Thereafter, your certificate card will come in the mail. Complete at least 5 VSCs each year to maintain certification.

This is the ideal time to learn the material, pass the test and be ready for VSCs in June. Contact me, John Hermann, Squadron Safety Officer, to get started or for more information. 920-743-1675 or john.c.hermann@gmail.com

BLUE LIGHTS FLASHING

What to expect when you're boarded.

The sight of flashing blue lights and a U.S. Coast Guard

patrol vessel pulling alongside is no reason to panic. The Coast Guard conducts 70,000 boardings a year, and the more time you spend on the water, the more likely it is that your vessel will be boarded.

When deciding whether to board your boat, the Coast Guard considers your activity, location and any obvious violations, such as operating at night without navigation lights or improper display of registration numbers.

The Coast Guard will often ask a series of pre-boarding questions: What was the vessel's last port of call and next port of call? How many people are on board? What is the voyage's purpose?

If you are boarded, two to four uniformed officers will come aboard, introduce themselves and state the reason for the boarding. The officer in charge will ask if you have any weapons aboard and conduct an initial safety inspection to identify any obvious safety hazards and verify your vessel's general seaworthiness.

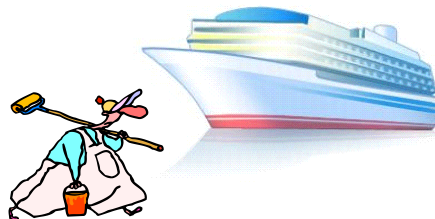
The officer will then ask to see the boat's registration or other documentation and proceed to a more detailed inspection of your vessel's required safety equipment, including life jackets, fire extinguishers and flares.

After the inspection, you will receive a copy of the boarding report. The copy will be yellow if no discrepancies were noted or white if there were. A white copy indicates a warning or a Notice of Violation, and the boarding officer will explain the procedures you will need to follow.

Ensure that your vessel meets all safety requirements by scheduling a free vessel safety check. [Click here](#) to contact our Squadron's Vessel Safety Check coordinator.

If your vessel doesn't pass, take the opportunity to correct any problems before you see those blue lights flashing.
