



COMMANDER'S MESSAGE

HEADING SOUTH FOR THE WINTER

When we move south to Austin, Texas for the Winter, it's mostly to see our grandson Rai, and only secondarily to enjoy the benefits of the warmer climate. It's a good thing too, as there hasn't been much warmer climate to be had. We did get a day of 80's, but followed immediately by a daily high of 37 degrees. Then we had rain, and rain, and rain. Lake Travis, which is just outside the window, is 40 feet low, but it was definitely weather for ducks.

We drove to Austin via Minneapolis, some 1500 miles and "a lot" of diesel fuel, when it was 35 degrees in Sturgeon Bay. Not exactly what we had in mind to start our second season. We were also treated to 200 miles of slush on the way down. It took all that next day to clean the 5th Wheel.

Mind you, it's still a great life, and we'll get plenty of nice weather while we are down here. My daughter's speedboat is in the marina next door, within walking distance, and I get usage rights for a bit of clean up. After sailing the wide open spaces of Lake Michigan, it's a different experience on a reservoir lake. We do get to take out some of the folks here at the RV park. Many have been on the shoreline here for years, but never experienced the boating lifestyle. We even had a couple we know from down here meet us for a sailboat ride in Sister Bay during the summer.

Dredging— 2013 Style (The Scuttlebutt Editor wishes to thank Jim & Gloria Walkowiak of the Skokie Valley Power Squadron for permission to reprint this article which appeared in the Skokie Valley PS Running Lights newsletter.)

“The dictionary says: Dredging is an activity usually carried out underwater or in shallow seas, for the purpose of gathering bottom sediments and disposing of them at a different location. This technique is often used to keep waterways navigable.” But there is another way to dredge!



We had an opportunity to visit Menominee, MI while in Door County with good friends John and Mary Welch this past month. We saw an amazing event taking place at the their municipal marina (Great Lakes Memorial marina). Cranes and trucks were driving on the bottom of the marina! Yes, about 14 feet below the stationary docks! Instead of dredging the marina as in the dictionary description above, the marina entrance from Lake Michigan was blocked (water tight),

and then the water in the marina basin was pumped out! This \$1.4 million dredging operation began after all boats left for winter storage. It is anticipated to be complete by year end. This will amount to 25,000 cubic yards being removed to provide 8 feet of water depth at the slips, and 10 feet at the marina entrance.

This 261 slip marina is a short hop across Green Bay, and is a very popular destination with boaters. The two times we joined with the Sturgeon Bay Power Squadron, every slip was taken. With lake levels falling these past years it became necessary to accommodate boats safely without bottoming out. The marina has a section of stationary docks and also floating docks.

We watched the cranes and trucks in operation near the stationary docks from behind a construction safety fence. The cranes would drag the bucket & scoop the dirt and place this in piles. This would allow the water to seep out of most of the pile. Then the crane would remove the top part of the pile, and place the drained dirt in huge dump trucks. We did not observe them working in the floating dock area.

After we arrived home and I started to put this story together, I googled the Menominee marina project for some more information. Guess what? We found a very informative web site, that has some nifty professional pictures of the work going on, taken by James LeBouton. We borrowed his picture of the aerial shot of the marina before dredging. One neat picture shows an overhead view of the entrance of the harbor, and how they blocked it, along with showing the huge pumps required to keep the water on the lake side of marina.



4. Pull the knot tight.





Figure 8 Construction



Scuttlebutt November Quiz Answer

Departing Milwaukee's McKinley marina heading for Manitowoc, Bay Belle's chart plotter went dark one hour out of port. Having the paper chart with Dolores' DR line became very important.

Statement: A single LOP can often be combined with depth information to provide an estimated position (EP). True or false?



A single LOP can often be combined with depth information to provide an estimated position (EP). The LOP shown above is a beam bearing. A depth reading of 21 feet has indicated that the estimate should be farther inshore than the DR track indicates.

Based on this chart reprinted out of Chapman's Piloting, Chapter 20 on Position Information, the correct answer is TRUE.
